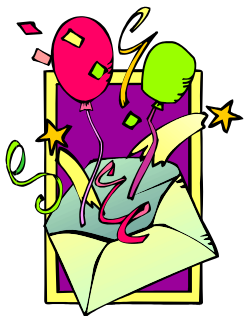

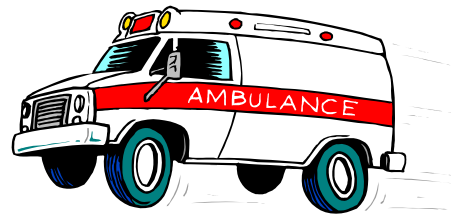

Nightmare ---

Anti-k present in an emergency patient !!!

A middle aged female presented in the emergency room with suspected intracranial haemorrhage. A specimen for Group, Rh and antibody screen was collected and received in the laboratory. The physician requested 4 units of red cell concentrate for probable surgery as well as 4 units of Fresh Frozen Plasma because the PT and INR were elevated. The patient was grouped as an O Rh positive and the antibody screen was positive by solid phase (red cell adherence) technique; an identification panel showed reactivity in all cells with 1 cell being slightly less positive. Auto control was negative. The direct antiglobulin test (DAT) was negative and information regarding transfusion history and medications was requested. Unfortunately the patient was unable to provide the transfusion history and medication list available was not helpful.

A Low Ionic Strength Solution (LISS) antibody screen and identification panel were performed, with one cell negative. There was some variation in degree of reactivity leading the technologist to suspect a multiple antibody pattern. A second panel cell was tested to confirm the suspected presence of Anti-Jka and Anti-S; the cell, both Jka and S negative reacted 2+. At the same time, antigen testing on the patient was performed. A comparison of the two negative cells suggested a "k" specificity. The patient tested positive for the K antigen. Fortunately Canadian Blood Services (CBS) in Saint John had a unit of Group O Rh positive k negative blood in stock and shipped it to our facility. Imagine our surprise when the unit was crossmatch incompatible!

Communication with the nursing staff revealed that the patient had undergone heart surgery at another medical facility approximately 4 years previously and had probably been transfused.

We had sent a sample to the CBS reference Lab in Ottawa for confirmation and they called within 24 hours with the report that, in fact, besides the anti-k, there was also an anti-E present. The unit we had tried to crossmatch for her was E positive. Fortunately the patient did not require a transfusion and sibling studies will be undertaken to determine if compatible units can be stored for her.

Anti-k is a red cell mediated immune antibody which can cause haemolytic transfusion reactions. Approximately 0.2% of donors are k antigen negative.

A cancer patient with a previously identified anti-Lu^b, presented to the emergency room at 5pm on a Sunday evening with a suspected Gastro-intestinal (GI) haemorrhage. Eight days prior her haemoglobin level was 117g/L; initial Complete Blood Count (CBC) result showed the Haemoglobin level to be 81g/L. The Emergency Room physician ordered 2 units for transfusion. The technologist called to explain the unlikely possibility of any antigen negative unit being available quickly. A call was made to Canadian Blood Services (CBS) Saint John where a unit of frozen, antigen compatible blood had been stored. The technologist on call at CBS immediately went in to begin the laborious procedure of deglycerolization and preparation of the unit for transport to our facility. The unit broke on the last wash. The technologist was horrified.

A call was made to CBS Halifax where there was at least one unit of Lu^b negative blood frozen. With the length of time for preparation and the distance to transport and a winter storm advisory in effect, everyone's nerves were a bit frazzled. The unit was prepared and transported to our facility in just under eight hours. The patient's haemoglobin was hovering between 76 and 82 g/L but the attending physician wanted to perform a procedure to determine the cause of the GI bleed. This unit was transfused without incident.



The Saint John center contacted a local Lu^b negative donor, who was able to come in that day to provide a donation. This unit was transfused soon after it had been cross-matched for the patient. The patient remains stable with a haemoglobin value of 104g/L.

Anti Lutheran antibodies are immune mediated and can cause decreased red cell survival as well as mild haemolytic disease of the newborn. Many Lutheran antibodies demonstrate dosage and high titre low avidity (HTLA) titration characteristics. The percentage of Lutheran^b negative donors is approximately 0.02%. This patient had developed anti Lu^b after a previous transfusion. The teamwork and communication challenges to provide blood for this patient were met successfully.

My Route to an ART Certification

I graduated in 1975 from NBCCSJ and at the time never intended to get an Advanced Registered Technologist – maybe a degree. I did submit and obtained credit for a literature review in 1981, but didn't proceed with advanced certification by doing either the project or written exam option.

When University of British Columbia (UBC) offered their degree by distance I applied (1992) – education by distance is great for a mom. I took six courses from UBC. The microscopy course required a 2-week practical on campus – a wonderful experience. This led to my working in Electron Microscopy in Saint John. (Chemistry 1975 – 1998; EM 1998 – 2001; NBCC 2001 -). By this time, I had a Certificate of Professional Studies (CPS) certificate (General) and a few additional credits.

Because I was working in EM, I took the Electron Microscopy course from Northern Alberta Institute of Technology (NAIT) and obtained a CPS in Electron Microscopy. I had 30 credits and started thinking about an ART (the new ART format - I now needed 45 credits).

The rest of the credits all came from Canadian Society for Medical Laboratory Science (CSMLS) distance courses. My last CPS was in Management (2002).

The first step of the ART process was a proposal for the clinical report which was accepted. Then the compilation of data which was time consuming but straightforward, and finally the written report. I submitted the report in December of 2003. It wasn't accepted – the data was okay but the written report wasn't. I mailed the re-submission in August of 2004, and it was accepted. My presentation, defense and oral exam were during March break at the office in Hamilton. The exam process was another positive experience.

So now I have my ART – what now? I've a few ideas; I'm leaving for Ethiopia for four weeks on Monday (June 27th) to volunteer at an orphanage. I've wanted to spend time in Africa since I was a kid. Maybe this was the road to get me there.

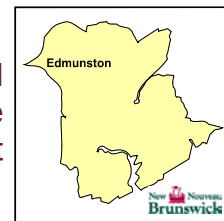

Also two grants of \$ 500.00 each were given among the other members of the academy, Eric Brisson (Bathurst) Denise Arseneau (Campbellton)

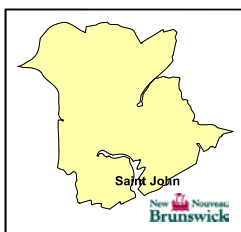

William Allen received his Bachelor of Med Lab Science and Sharon Nason achieved her ART. Congratulations to both of them!

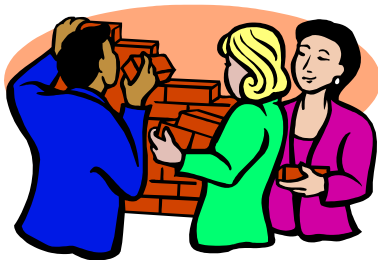
Tammy Raynes will be taking a course in Toronto on 'Intro to Molecular DNA Techniques'.

For the Costume party on Friday night, anyone who comes in costume will receive a free drink ticket!

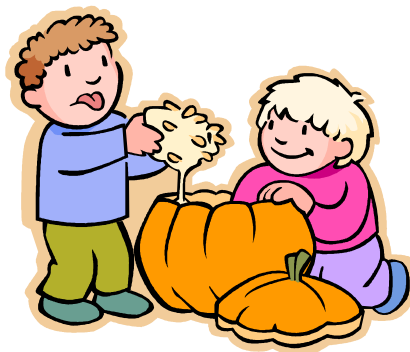
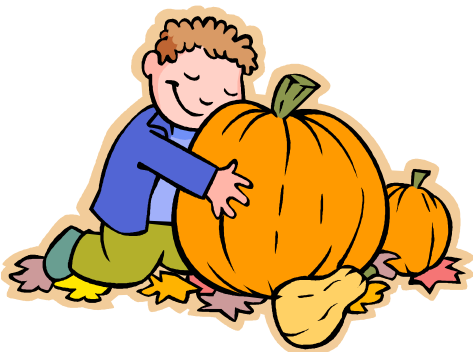
